NOTE: The information contained in this flowchart is intended to serve as a general guide. All McKinney-Vento eligibility determinations should be made on a case-bycase basis weighing the individual circumstances of each student. To be eligible for McKinney-Vento services as an unaccompanied homeless student, the student must meet the criteria of both homeless and unaccompanied.

MCKINNEY-VENTO DEFINITION OF HOMELESSNESS

 Sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason ("doubling up")

- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to the lack of adequate alternative accommodations
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters

Living in a public or private place not designed for habitation

- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or a similar setting
- Abandoned, runaway or pushed-out youth or migratory children living in any of the above circumstances

The McKinney-Vento/Schools Definition of Homeless

- The term "homeless children and youths"--
- Individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence



HUD DEFINITION OF HOMELESSNESS

(1) INDIVIDUAL OR FAMILY WHO LACKS A FIXED, REGULAR, AND ADEQUATE NIGHTTIME RESIDENCE

CATEGORY 1: LITERALLY HOMELESS

 (I) HAS A PRIMARY NIGHTTIME RESIDENCE THAT IS A PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PLACE
NOT MEANT FOR HUMAN HABITATION; (II) IS LIVING IN A PUBLICLY OR PRIVATELY
OPERATED SHELTER DESIGNATED TO PROVIDE TEMPORARY LIVING
ARRANGEMENTS (INCLUDING CONGREGATE SHELTERS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, AND HOTELS AND MOTELS PAID FOR BY CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS.

Category 2: Imminent Risk of Homelessness

(2) Individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence, provided that: (i) Residence will be lost within 14 days of the date of application for homeless assistance.

Category 3: Homeless under other Federal statutes

(3) Unaccompanied youth under 25 years of age, or families with children and youth, who do not otherwise qualify as homeless under this definition, but who: (i) Are defined as homeless under the other listed federal statutes.

Category 4: Fleeing/ Attempting to Flee DV

(4) Any individual or family who: (i) Is fleeing, or is attempting to flee, domestic violence;(ii) Has no other residence; and (iii) Lacks the resources or support networks

Federal Definition of Homelessness

- U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
- Does not include doubled up or

families who pay for own motel room



Shelter Referral Process

All CRS and FCL trained to support families with shelter/housing needs

•**SSA** Motel Voucher (16-day) The **FSC** is comprised of 24 leading family service organizations in Orange County working to prevent, divert and house homeless families in a prompt and coordinated effort OCDE and FCC **Shelter** partnership

• Casa Youth Shelter (ages 12-17)

Collaboration Between School and a Motel to Provide Short-Term Emergency Housing



- MTSS- Targeted individualized support and immediate access to short term housing
- Develop relationships between motel/managers to serve unhoused students more efficiently
- 3-5 day bridge housing/ short- term while awaiting shelter placement or other housing arrangements

- Supported by LCAP funds and community partners





Orange County Department of Education Homeless Outreach to Promote Educational Success HOPES Collaborative


- The HOPES Collaborative works to remove:
