



Mindful Moment

- Short distinct moment of stillness
- Focus on breathing
- Disconnect from other stimuli
- Cell phones off/mute













State the Purpose

- Directs the Circle
- Sets expectations
- Why are we here?













Opening Activity

- Begins a sacred space
- Helps participants center themselves
- Relevant to the purpose
- Examples include:



















Centerpieces

 A place to focus your eyes















Talking Pieces

- An important element
- Controls the conversation
- Invited to speak
- Passes person to person
- Only the holder may speak














Introductions and Check-in

- What do participants want to be called?
- Share about themselves
- Get to know one another better
- Start making connections















Values

- Important to feel safe
- Honor people's values
- Place values in center















Guidelines

- #1 Respect the Talking
 Piece
- Best when it comes from the participants
- All must agree
- Hold a good space together
- Rules of the room

Circle Process


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






Trust Building

- Keeper goes first
- Share personal stories
- Increase understanding or connection
- Hear one another more clearly













Discussion

- Explore purpose
- Engage in an activity
- Multiple rounds
- Draw out reflections
- Thank participants
- Acknowledge courage
- Keeper goes last














Closing Round/Check Out

- Participants share thoughts about the Circle
- Keeper goes last













Closing Activity

- Closes a sacred space
- Relevant to purpose
- Same type as the Opening Activity

- Supports mental health and well-being








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
